## School Advisory Council Treasurer's Report



- In 2025, there will be a 4% increase to **School Fees** in line with CPI increases. This fee increase is consistent with inflationary operating costs that will impact the school. It has been applied across all tuition and levies.
- In 2025 the IT levy will be:
  - K-3: \$101/student (school supplied devices)
  - Year 4-6: \$73/student (BYOD)

## School Advisory Council Treasurer's Report



- The **Building Levy** remains calculated at 20% of the tuition fee and supports capital development and renewal of facilities. No government funding is received for capital improvements.
- The Resource Levy is used to purchase resources to support the teaching and learning program including, MiniLit, MacqLit, InitiaLit, Spellex, English Stars, PAT Testing, Literacy & Numeracy resources.
- **Booklist Levy** is a levy to cover ALL booklist items for your child. In 2025, this will be:
  - ⋟ \$47 Kindy
  - ⋟ \$62 PP-6






- Introduction of Spellex as an evidence-based spelling program into Year 3.







### Literacy – Year 5 READING





### Literacy – Year 5 WRITING








